Siblings in Christ -

I'm writing this to talk about the conversations we have been having about our future. These conversations began in 2021. They were driven by questions about the financial stability of Faith Lutheran Church.

On the one hand, I know that all of you are good stewards, who support the work of Faith and other charities to the best of your ability. I know that many in our community are on fixed incomes. Moreover, given the size of our congregation, you give faithfully of your time, talent and treasure.

However, our current path does not seem to be sustainable.

The council has been working on visioning for where the future might take us. Working with the synod, Bishop Laurie has outlined for the whole congregation four potential paths for our congregation. We are having listening seasons to determine the possibility of any of these paths.

To be clear the congregation will pick what path, if any we take. I do not have a preference for the congregation to choose friendship, or radical redevelopment, or holy closure, or partnering. But I feel it important as your pastor to encourage the discussion. Because if we don't make a choice as a group and support that choice as a group, then I worry that we will just continue to follow our demographic trends.

We are not alone in this. Christians are never alone. Our story is after all a resurrection story, a hope and trust in the God of the living and the dead. We believe in the communion of saints, of the body of Christ that joins us in mystic sweet communion. And so whatever we chose - whether it be to keep our current course or go through friendship with other congregations, or to work to radically transform, Jesus goes with us.

Parsonage House Project Update

About the middle of February 2023, the parsonage became vacant after several years of having the same tenant. A group of us looked at the house and we were astonished at the opportunities ahead of us to spruce up the house and fix some issues we noticed.

We had a limited budget and had already contracted out the exterior lead paint remediation and exterior painting of the house. While the contractor was in the early stages of preparing the house for painting it became clear that some of the exterior siding on the east facing wall above the garage had to be removed and replaced. That cut into our budget just a little bit more. Now all the exterior work is complete. The new house color and uniformity make the house look great.

During the last three months, a group of dedicated volunteers have taken on the interior and have either washed or scraped or sanded every surface inside the house. I believe all the walls have been painted. All previously painted built-in cabinets have been repainted and all of the ceilings have been painted. Almost all the doors have been adjusted so that they open and close properly.

We removed all the electrical switch plate covers and electrical plug covers. They have all been replaced with new covers. Open existing electrical boxes have been covered for safety reasons. Electrical junction boxes and electrical fuse boxes have been cleaned and their doors now operate easily. We repaired a few three-way switch circuits and replaced non-LED light bulbs with LED bulbs where possible.

We removed all the old window blinds hardware and all the curtain rods to make painting easier. We washed all the curtains in the house and reinstalled as many of the curtain rods as possible and hung curtains back in place if the curtains made it through the washing cycle (some did not). I believe all the door hardware, hinges and doorknobs, have been cleaned and many layers of paint removed. Most of the hardware looks new or close to it. Door pulls and electrical switches had multiple layers of paint removed as well.

Old nonfunctioning telephone and cable TV leads attached to the outside of the house were removed and holes in the walls were plugged. The old weather head for the second electricals service was removed and holes where critters could gain entry to the house were plugged. Damage to walls caused by critter infestations was cleaned up and remediation to help eliminate future damage was put in place.

We noticed a leaking drainpipe under the house and contacted a plumber to come fix that problem. We also cleaned out a couple of "P" traps under the bathroom and mudroom sinks. The drains all seem to function well now. The two bathtub enclosures had some mold issues and needed to have their caulking replaced. That job made the bathrooms look much better. New handrails were installed on the internal stairways, and it is my hope those stairs will be much safer to use in the years to come.

In the kitchen the under-counter cabinet was modified to accept a new dishwasher next to the sink. New electrical and plumbing connections were installed, and the dishwasher was tested to ensure no leaks and quiet operation.

Throughout the house a few ceiling light fixtures were repaired or replaced, depending upon the current state of the fixture. All the glass from existing light fixtures was removed, washed and reinstalled.

The furnace needed to have a better way to allow the air filter to be changed on a regular basis. We contacted an HVAC contractor to fabricate and install that unit and now the system is much more airtight.

Gaping holes in the walls and behind built-in cupboards (which allowed critters to gain access to inside the house) were plugged and made more energy efficient, hopefully eliminating at least some outside air intrusion.

We tore up the old linoleum floor upstairs and installed beautiful LVP flooring in what used to be the upstairs kitchen. New baseboards were also installed. Some existing fir flooring was patched upstairs as well.

It has been a fun and yet exhausting past few months but I'm sure the house is in much better shape now than it was before we started this process. We still have a few tasks to complete but will have to schedule that work after the new tenant moves in.

A Message from Church Council to Members of Faith Lutheran

Friends:

I need not tell you that we are facing challenges to our traditional congregation as we proceed into the future. I am sure you are getting tired of hearing this same theme. We have discussed the matter often and I, too, am getting weary of uncertainty. For that reason, Pastor Mark and I recently sent out a letter to mid-valley churches which are Lutheran or “ Communion partners” with this congregation. That letter is shown below. It is an explicit overture to those congregations to explore how we might enter into partnership(s). These partnership(s) could take different forms, however, to address our challenges in a real sense it would need to involve the sharing of resources.

I think the letter is self-explanatory and to the point. I urge you to read it carefully. I will paraphrase here one part as follows:

Are we reaching out to the community? Yes! Are we employing new technology such as web based services? Yes! Is our pastor operating on a reduced schedule? Yes! The list goes on. Eventually, if the trends continue, our situation likely will not be sustainable in its present form.

I do not desire to wait until we are boxed into a corner. I want to explore partnerships now that would both strengthen us for the future while we have options. Yes, this could involve sharing pastors, facilities, services, etc. The message is strengthen our community while maintaining our unique identity. There is a whole world of opportunity out there. Thus, far we are in discussions with 3 other churches. These discussions are in just the preliminary stage. They may not result in any option that is satisfactory to us or them but if we don't make the overture now, we may pass up the opportunity when we are more in need. Remember that no matter what I, Pastor Mark or the Council can arrange, the ultimate choice is made by the congregation. When I know more, I will share. Mary Sabatka Gamet has taken an active role in pursuing this effort. If you have questions or concerns or encouragement feel free to contact her, myself or Pastor Mark.

Letter Sent to Potential Partners:

Attn: Church Council Presidents and Community of Christian Congregations of the Central Valley

Friends:

Our congregations are facing unprecedented challenges in today's world. The challenges are being experienced by both our ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Churches of America) congregations and our friends in other denominations. Members of congregations are aging and younger generations are not coming forward to be active congregational members. These ongoing demographics have been

shadowed by the recent three years of pandemic. The pandemic isolated members and contributed to loss of members. The result has been a sustained reduction in the size of our congregations. This of course negatively impacts the available giving needed to support our organizations. At the same time, there has been a reduction in the availability of pastors and ministers available to the congregations. We believe this stems from pastors retiring, leaving the ministry and fewer people being called to word and sacrament.

At Faith Lutheran Church in Albany we have experienced the loss of membership and the coincidental strain on resources. In the last 3 years, we have lost 20 members to deaths and 12 others have moved on for various reasons. This amounts to 27 % of our stated congregational population. We continue to respond by doing more with less. Although we are solvent and should continue to be so in the near term, we are trying to vision into the uncertain future and be prepared.

Are we reaching out to the community? Yes! Are we employing new technology such as web-based services? Yes! Is our pastor operating on a reduced schedule? Yes! The list goes on. Eventually, if the trends continue, our situation likely will not be sustainable in its present form.

That is why I am reaching out to you, our friends in the Christian Community. By now most of you should be familiar with the concepts of partnering congregations. There are many levels that partnering can take. Simple community potlucks and events come to mind. However, I believe that more aggressive measures can and should be considered. This could involve sharing pastors, facilities, services, etc.

Our message to you is that Faith Lutheran, here in Albany, is open to exploring these type of measures between mid-valley Lutheran and Christian communion partners. These type of alliances could pool our assets and make us stronger using the resources, clerical personnel and lay members that we have. Pursuing these alliances does mean change but not necessarily loss of identity. Please consider these concepts carefully. We welcome any response to this overture that you may feel appropriate. We would like to hear back from you by June 1st.
