

Sisters and brothers (you might recognize this as the first half of Pastor Mark's annual report)

2021 resembled 2020 far more than any of us would have hoped. We began the year in the parking lot, where I preached into a microphone so that people could hear me in their cars and over a Facebook livestream. We came inside for worship in the sanctuary for Easter, went outside for better ventilation, inside to escape the heat, took our masks off, put our masks back on. We streamed over Facebook and YouTube, had people bring their own communion, shared communion, sang, stopped singing. We quilted, gathered for bible studies (over Zoom no less), brought food together, helped with laundry, supported sister organizations. We did a little bit of everything never quite knowing what the future might hold. In short, 2021 was a roller coaster.

What did Faith Lutheran Church accomplish during this time? Following the Holy Spirit and health advisories, we cared for each other, taking steps forward, pausing, backing up, coming together. This process has been frustrating for all of us but one thing is clear: we are God's family together, loving and caring for each other. Our community is a mix of newer members like myself and long time members who have been here for twenty years or more. Writing this at the end of January 2021, I am struck by the changes in our community: by the members

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who joined the church triumphant, by the families that have stayed home out of an abundance of caution, by the visitors who have come to our congregation regularly over the last few months.

Faith Lutheran Church is clearly in a time of transition. This was the purpose of the visioning retreats in August and October of 2021, was presented in congregational meeting in December and has been a topic of discussion. This is difficult to bring up and discuss because anything that we as a congregation do means a change from what has come before. It is always easier to keep doing things the way it was before because it is what we are familiar with.

God calls us – continually and always – into new life. In the Bible God calls Abram from his home (Genesis 12), speaks to Moses from the burning bush to bring his people to a new land (Exodus 3), calls the prophets to stir the people (see Jeremiah 1 and Isaiah 6 as examples). Jesus calls the disciples to new life in ministry (in Luke 5 among other places), calls Saul from his old life (Galatians 1 among other places). God takes people from what they know and leads them into a new life.

The Holy Spirit continually presses people from comfort and ease to take them to where the world is aching and in pain. And that change is never easy. Abraham sees his children split apart, Moses never gets to enter the promised land, the prophets are imprisoned, the disciples are persecuted, Paul; is arrested. But people go from certainty to uncertainty because God is with them, because the triune God, Creator, Redeemer and Sanctifier, stirs in them.

We at Faith Lutheran Church are working hard to discern where God is calling us. We do this confident in God's presence among us. We don't know what it will lead our congregation to. Changes could lead to a revitalization and growth in our numbers. Changes could lead to a deepening of our faith and a nurturing of the community here. Changes could bring about inward, Spirit led growth and no external growth.

I don't know what the future of Faith Lutheran Church is, but I know that God is with us in it.

Church Announcements and Events

Shrove Tuesday/Mardi Gras—Tuesday, March 1st @ 2pm

Pastor Mark will be burning the palms on the back patio and will have a brief (10 minute service) for all those who wish to participate. Please let him know if you wish to join.

Ash Wednesday Services—Wednesday, March 2nd @11:30am &7:00pm

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of the great 40 days, the beginning of Lent. It recalls the curse of Genesis 3:19 "you are dust and to dust shall return." It is a reminder that we are both saint and sinner; that we fall short of God's hopes for us. It is the beginning of a season of repentance and renewal.

Ash Wednesday has a few liturgical elements to it. **Imposition of Ashes**: this is where the name of the day comes from. On Shrove Tuesday (or Mardi Gras) the dried palms from Palm Sunday are burned. These ashes are mixed with oil, which we use for anointing, and are then placed upon our forehead. This is a powerful reminder, on one hand, of our mortality. The ashes are dead and burned, there seems to be no life in them. On the other hand, it is a reminder of God's eternal promise; the ashes are placed on our forehead in the place where we are anointed during baptism. It is the cross, the sign of Christ's death and resurrection; that is placed on our head. Thus it reminds us that we will die and be pulled through the waters of death to new life in Christ.

Confession of Sins: in the Lutheran tradition, our worship often begins with a corporate confession of sin (where we inwardly confess our sins to God). After this, on Sundays we hear the declaration of forgiveness. On Ash Wednesday, alone of the year, we confess our sins, hear the promise of forgiveness but do not have the declaration of forgiveness. In a sense it is a `hanging' confession, waiting through the entirety of Lent, until Maundy Thursday where we together declare to each other the forgiveness of sin in obedience to God's command.

Communion: We eat together the Lord's Supper every Sunday. Ash Wednesday is also a good time to begin our time of Lent together. It reminds us that while we might fast in Lent, from chocolate, or meat, or social media, or television, while we might fast from many things that we never fast from our relationship with God. Though we might, in brokenness and sin, turn away from God, again and again, God turns us back to God.
