Dear People of God at Faith Lutheran Church,

Jesus taught with stories, parables, using everyday concepts and life experiences in order to communicate something of the reality of God's kingdom. Some of his parables are beautiful in helping us see a bit more of God's reign in this world. Others, well, not so much. Hahaha!

I was thinking about some parables of Jesus, and what they might mean for us today. Do they have some measure of insight for this time of transition in Faith's life?

In Matthew 13 there are seven and one-half parables all about the God's reign in the world. Added in are two explanations of two parables for the disciples' sake. The chapter ends with three short parables and a question. These are so apropos for this time and place.

From 13:44-52 Jesus goes deep with his disciples on God's reign. First, the parable of the treasure hidden in a field and discovered, then the purchase of the field for the sake of owning the treasure. The second is a parable of a merchant searching for the finest of pearls and on find one supreme pearl sells everything to buy that pearl. And the third parable is about sorting fish after hauling in the full net.

All of these seem to be telling of the search and acquisition of something of great value. The hidden treasure and the priceless pearl tell of giving up every possession in order to afford buying that thing of immeasurable worth, to possess it. The third parable of the full fishing net tells of sorting through the fish to keep the good fish for sale, throwing out the bad, so as not to weigh down the catch.

When Jesus was finished teaching his followers about the kingdom of God, he asks them, "Have you understood all this?" They answer that they get it! Really? Then J compares those who understand about the kingdom of God to someone who sorts through their treasures and "brings out" what is new and old. Problem. The word that's been translated for "brings out" tends to mean to throw away, get rid of, no longer possess.

"Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who throws out of his treasure what is new and what is old (Matt 13:52.)" WOW! What does that mean? How does that help us understand God's reign in this time and place?

The thing is, God is up to something in this world. And God is up to something in you also. It's the Kingdom of God being shaped and built and reworked and remodeled and torn down and ... God is constantly working on the kingdom, which is being built here and now. The reign of God is not static, it is dynamic. DYNAMIC! Alive and evolving! With every time and age and place, God is at work. So what do that mean for Faith? For you?

Some thoughts come to my mind. The way we have always done things no longer works for God's reign in this present time. Our vision of "church" is not God's vision for the Body of Christ. If we are not willing to let go of (throw away) what doesn't work any longer, or come to terms with Faith's current reality, then we have sold the field or the pearl of great value. Then we have lost sight of what is at the heart of God's reign. It is not possessions, or the way we have done "church" or whatever we continue to hold on to as if it were a life raft. God is not in the business of survival. God is all about new life. A life filled with all of God's mercy and grace and love for the world. The reign of God is our desire as people of faith in the One who came to show us abundant life through Christ Jesus.

Maybe you need to let go of some things that have impeded God's reign in your own life. Maybe you can write down what those are and then find a way to let go and trust God's reign in your life.

I am reminded of Matthew 9:17 where J talks about not putting new wine into old wineskins. That our faith, joy, and hope in Christ Jesus is being renewed and cannot be contained in what has been, but in the new and on-going building of the reign of God among us.

Not easy stuff, but necessary for our renewal and hope for the mission of Faith, however God will transform it. Send your Spirit, O God. Come and build anew. Show us your vision of the path ahead. Come!

May God's reign continue to grow in each of us,

Annual School Supply Drive

Sales will begin soon in local stores so it's the perfect time to begin collecting items for the Annual School Supply Drive. Education is important for any community, but especially where poverty or disaster have limited the options for young people to reach their potential. School kits that contain essential supplies can help ensure they can continue learning despite the hardships they face. The goal is for 75 kits to be donated through Lutheran World Relief.

ITEMS NEEDED FOR EACH SCHOOL KIT:

- Four <u>70-sheet notebooks</u> of wide or college-ruled paper approximately 8 x 10 ½"
- One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- One <u>pencil sharpener</u>
- One <u>blunt scissors</u> (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- One 2 ½ inch pink eraser
- Five <u>unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers</u>; secure together with a rubber band
- Five ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- One box of 16 or 24 crayons
